How to make a mini house with cardboard

A cardboard house is a staple of childhood fun, and I'm no exception - I made one as a kid, and my daughter brought one back from school recently. While cardboard houses are visually appealing, they're even more enjoyable when you can open them up and play inside. In this article, we'll explore some fantastic cardboard dollhouses, shoebox rooms, and mini houses that you and your kids can customize and decorate to their hearts' content. As a parent, I've had my fair share of creating cardboard masterpieces with my kids, from simple cereal box dollhouses to more complex multi-storey creations. In this post, we'll focus on DIY cardboard houses and provide some essential tips for making them a reality. To get started, you'll need some basic materials: a ruler, pencil, scissors, glue, and of course, a cardboard box or two. Depending on the size and style of your house, you may also want to add some masking tape or colored duct tape for extra flair. Once you have these essentials, you can begin crafting your very own cardboard house. One important thing to keep in mind when working with cardboard is its susceptibility to warping and weakening when exposed to water. To avoid this, it's best to use a waterproof sealant like gesso before painting your mini cardboard house. Apply two coats of gesso, allowing the first coat to dry for 24 hours before adding the second. Once the gesso is dry, you can start painting with thin layers of acrylic paint. Use a dry brush to apply the paint and avoid applying it directly from the tube to the cardboard. If you want to speed up the decorating process, you can apply acrylic paint directly to the cardboard, but be aware that this may make the cardboard weaker if not sealed first. As for me, I recently created a Paw Patrol car park with Evan using some recycled boxes and masking tape, which kept him entertained for two whole days. The possibilities are endless when it comes to cardboard creations! Firstly, we leaped straight into the decorating part and skipped over a few crucial steps! To give you a heads up, it's worth noting that some PVA glues can cause issues with thin cardboard or make your wallpaper bubble. So, if you're planning to use glue on your craft paper as wallpaper, it's best to opt for a glue stick instead. Now that we've covered the basics, let's get creative and start building those adorable cardboard houses for our beloved character toys! We've given this a try ourselves, and I've also been researching some fantastic projects to tackle in the future - keep an eye out below for some awesome mini cardboard house tutorials online. When working with cardboard, cereal boxes are an excellent starting point if you're new to crafting. The cardboard is less thick than corrugated boxes, making it easier to cut and fold, as well as paint. In this section, we'll explore a few simple methods for creating cardboard dollhouses from cereal boxes. This video showcases how to make an elegant cardboard house using just a cereal box - perfect if you don't have any thicker corrugated cardboard on hand! Thinner cardboard like cereal boxes is ideal for crafting with younger kids, as it's much more manageable. To create this cardboard house, all you'll need is: * A cereal box * Scissors and a craft knife * Acrylic paint and brush * A ruler * More cardboard for the floors If you'd rather avoid getting messy with paint, you can use coloured or patterned card and glue it onto the walls as wallpaper instead. The detail in this cereal box dollhouse is what makes it so lovely - the crafter has added a window with a curtain, painted beautiful wallpaper and furniture, and even used fabric samples as carpet! Sometimes, when both our kids are playing with their Sylvanian dollhouse, they struggle to find room or see what they're doing. That's why I love this DIY foldable dollhouse - it doesn't have a roof, so kids can play from the top and it's portable for instant play scenes anywhere! To get started, you'll need: * Two cereal boxes * Duct tape (works better than Sellotape) * Coloured paper or acrylic paint to decorate the walls * Scissors * A ruler * Glue stick * White paper and pens to draw furniture on (or download printables from this tutorial here) This cardboard house is perfect for Sylvanian Family characters, Playmobil figures, and other characters on the 1:12 to 1:24 scales. We had our fair share of struggles building our dollhouse, to be honest, it took me some time to get used to folding and cutting the doors. At one point we were close to having a door in the floor! Once we made the cardboard structure, we covered the walls with scrapbooking paper and created carpets. Unfortunately, my mum's glue sticks had run out, so I had to use PVA glue which caused some wrinkles and warping. Despite this, it was still fun to make, especially on a cold day, and the kids loved playing with it. This one is more complex than our previous attempts, but it looks like fun to make and is very stylish! Unlike our other cereal box houses, you can't open this one up to play inside, but you could create an entire town with your kids' toy characters hanging out on the porches. You could even add toy cars and accessories like traffic lights to the play space. It's also easy to customize this house, and I used paper flowers to decorate it, but you can add any embellishments you like! To build this beautiful modern cardboard house, you'll need 3 cereal boxes, colored paper, lolly sticks, and glue (Bluetooth picks or kebab sticks). The first step is to gather your materials: cardboard boxes in random sizes, an old notebook, a craft knife, ruler, black paper, white A4 sheet, some paper, glue, and spray paint (optional). Cover your project with these tiles, leaving small gaps between each one for a unique effect. Don't forget to add some square holes or grooves for the doors - I used a dark blue paint to give my structure a dramatic look. If you're feeling adventurous, try adding some details like windows, furniture, or even a garden. The possibilities are endless, and it's all about using your imagination. Create Miniature Houses Using Cardboard Gather materials such as cardboard boxes or newspaper, scissors, utility knife, white glue, acrylic paint, and paintbrushes. Design your houses according to size and number, inspired by real-life homes. Tear cardboard into small pieces and tile them over windows, roofs, and other areas for a seamless look. Add details like door outlines, handles, and chimney tops to enhance realism. Use paper rolls as roof supports and secure the structure with glue. Paint the houses with acrylic paint and add finishing touches like window boxes. Utilize leftover cardboard and newspaper to create unique miniature houses that serve as decorative items or conversation pieces. Start by creating a plan for your miniatures, then cut out windows and doors using scissors or utility knives, making sure to leave space for door openings. Cut out two triangular pieces from cardboard or foam to create roof supports. Apply glue to all three edges of each piece and attach them to the ends of the roof, ensuring they sit snugly on top of the house with the roof resting on their pointed tips. Hold each end for 30 seconds to allow the glue to set properly. Create a small chimney using a cardboard box by cutting one end at an angle matching the roof's slope. Secure the chimney to the roof with glue and let it dry for at least an hour. Paint the exterior walls, door, and window trim in different colors - for example, yellow walls with white trim. Allow each layer of paint to fully dry before proceeding. Finally, apply a coat of roof color such as gray or rust to the roof, using a fine brush to create shingle patterns if desired. Add decorative touches like painted flower boxes and flowers beneath the windows, or details like a brass doorknob, with a fine tip brush or other suitable tools.

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
